Dear UMCSO Family,

February 14, is Ash Wednesday; the beginning of Lent. It is 46 days before Easter. It's a day when worshipers around the world have the opportunity to receive lightly rubbed ashes in the sign of the cross onto their foreheads or hands. The use of ashes



as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship. Historically, ashes signified purification and sorrow for sins. It is traditional to save the palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday service to burn to produce ashes for this service. This symbolism echoes the Near Eastern tradition of throwing ash over one's head to signify repentance before God. It is also a reminder of death and the necessity of changed lives. What is repentance? In the Hebrew bible, transgression and sin are the inevitable consequences of straying from God, and by confessing our sins we will gain forgiveness and pardon. In the New Testament, repentance is central to the gospel of Jesus Christ. It means a turn or change of heart. We are encouraged to turn back toward God.

The first time that I experienced Ash Wednesday I was a student Pastor at Fairfield Grace United Methodist Church in Fairfield in 1993. The imposing of ashes was new to many in the Methodist Church; I was really blessed. As a part of the service, we nailed our sins to the cross and then were given a nail to symbolize Christ sacrifice for us all. United Methodists have had resources for worship that include the imposition of ashes since 1979, but this practice became part of our official worship resources in 1992 when General Conference adopted *The United Methodist Book of Worship*.

As we approach the season of Lent, I invite you to open your hearts to God in a deeper way. The preparatory season of Lent offers us 46 days to reflect, study, examine our lives, and discipline ourselves before we enjoy the celebration of Easter. How can we be faithful to the purpose of Lent? Our busy lives seem to allow little time for contemplation and reflection. However, at this time of year it is so important that we find time to stop and be quiet so that, in the stillness, we can connect more deeply with God's presence. It's difficult to find that quiet place when we keep such busy schedules that prayer only happens at traffic lights or between meetings, or when we squeeze in study and reflection over a sandwich at lunch break. Thinking about our Lenten discipline does not produce the benefit of keeping the discipline.

Careful time management is the key. Stay on top of life's tasks at home and at work, so that everyday stresses don't spill over into your time with God. Plan time away for yourself and be faithful to your plans. Use the time to deeply consider Christ's presence in your life and how you may refocus and recommit your life to him. This year, make the time for thoughtful, deliberate planning and preparation during the season of Lent. Then, when you come together with the church to celebrate the joyous resurrection of our Lord, you'll enjoy deeper fulfillment and a greater sense of the wonder and blessings of the Christian life as you renew your faith commitment, share your joys and your sorrows, and your hopes and your dreams with God. God is faithful and wants to welcome you home into his arms. During this season of Lent, open your hearts to the spiritual disciplines, such as fasting, praying, serving and studying the Word of God, and simply being available and focused on God. Let us trust that God will draw near and help us through our desert places with the desire to turn towards Him.

This year we have many other opportunities to grow in the Lord during our Lenten season. Please refer to your upcoming weekly bulletins for service times and dates, events and opportunities.



African American History Month 2024



In Recognition of African American History Month, I submit this brief article about the Harlem Renaissance. This article is by no means exhaustive of this time in Harlem when the world recognized the amazing gift of African American music art, literature, and dance. Imagine that you lived in New York City in the 1920's in Harlem on 125th street. You would be at the hub of an explosion of art, music, and literature created by African Americans. You would have been the first to read Poetry written by James Weldon Johnson, Paul Dunbar, Claude McKay and, my favorite, Langston Hughes, in the Messenger and other progressive newspapers all over the

country.

It was Langston Hughes who wrote:

The Negro Speaks of Rivers

I've known rivers:

I've known rivers ancient as the world and older than the flow of human blood in human veins. My soul has grown deep like the rivers.

I bathed in the Euphrates when dawns were young. I built my hut near the Congo and it lulled me to sleep. I looked upon the Nile and raised the pyramids above it. I heard the singing of the Mississippi when Abe Lincoln went down to New Orleans, and I've seen its muddy bosom turn all golden in the sunset. <section-header>

I've known rivers: Ancient, dusky rivers.

My soul has grown deep like the rivers.

If not Hughes, then Dunbar:

Compensation

Because I had loved so deeply, Because I had loved so long, God in His great compassion Gave the gift of song.

Because I have loved so vainly, And sung with such faltering breath, The Master in infinite mercy Offers the boon of Death.



To conclude, a word about music during the Harlem Renaissance. The Jazz age coincided with the Harlem Renaissance. The Jazz age blossomed in Harlem. Everyone who was anyone tried to get into the Cotton club in Harlem to hear Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Cab Calloway, Earl Hine, Count Basie, or Jelly Roll Morton.





Armstrong was, by the 1930's crowned King of the Jazz. Yet, most of these musicians mentioned above were known as composers who made improvisation the key feature of jazz music. Key instruments in jazz music are piano, saxophone, trombone. All musicians referred to above made substantial contributions to the

growth of jazz, blues and their late coming little sister, Rock and Roll.

If you have a free afternoon, take a tour of Harlem, and see the places and listen to the stories about the people mentioned in this very brief article about the Harlem Renaissance.
